Township Eagles' Nest Has Two Babies

EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP has been home to a pair of nesting eagles since 2013. This year, they raised two eaglets who successfully flew from their nest, hopefully to continue to grow and mature over the next four years before they gain the white head and tail feathers of an adult eagle and begin to search for their own mates. The US Eagle population dropped from over 200,000 pairs in the 1700's to as low as 500 pairs, and has rebounded to about 35,000 pairs across North America.

MATTY DALRYMPLE — LOCAL AUTHOR


Around the Township is an ongoing series of feature articles about Township residents, volunteers, and employees.

EAST BRANDYWINE RESIDENT Matty Dalrymple leads a double life: by day, a supply chain project manager at QVC, by night (and on the weekends), an author of suspense novels. Her books involve people with an extraordinary skill dealing with the ordinary world, and were first inspired by a visit to the Lake Yellowstone Hotel. If ever a hotel were to be haunted, Lake Yellowstone would be it, and the question arose: What would it be like to be able to see those spirits, and what mischief and mayhem might ensue?

In her first book, *The Sense of Death*, much of the action takes place in Chester County. Ann Kinnear, the novel's fascinating protagonist, investigates the disappearance of a Philadelphia socialite, finding herself in danger as she uncovers secrets hidden behind wealth and privilege. In the second book, *The Sense of Reckoning*, Ann goes to Maine and gets caught up in helping to save a crumbling summer hotel by uncovering secrets that died with the previous owners. But the danger threatens not just the hotel, but also Ann and her colleagues. Matty's third novel, also set largely in Chester County, is planned for release in early 2017.

Matty has spent most of her life in Pennsylvania, growing up in York, and earning a Bachelor's Degree in English Literature from Dickinson College and a Master's Degree in Organizational Dynamics from the University of Pennsylvania. She has lived in Chester County for the past 20 years—first in West Chester Borough and now in East Brandywine Township with her husband and three dogs, the most recent addition a terrier from All 4 Paws Rescue.

Guthriesville Has a New Market!

O'Connor's Market is Now Open

TIRED OF DRIVING to Thorndale for milk? To Exton for a loaf of bread? Well, relief has arrived with the opening of O'Connor's Market, a grocery/delicatessen store located in the Guthriesville Plaza next to the Medicine Shoppe on Route 322 (address is 1165 Horseshoe Pike; see: WWW.OCONNORSMARKET.COM). Since the closing of Stauffer's Market last summer, the local community has been without a grocery store forcing shoppers to brave the traffic down to Caln (Giant and Acme) or to Downingtown/Exton (Wegmans) to do their shopping. Although O'Connor's is a small, family-owned food market and is not targeted to compete with the large box stores like Acme or Giant, it does bring local shoppers a convenience that we've been lacking for the past year.

Opened on June 9th, O'Connor's offers a selection of food products including deli meats (Dietz & Watson), salads, fresh meats, chicken, pork, sausage, and on the weekends, a selection of seafood. Also, the store carries convenience items such as milk, eggs, and bread. Customers can order large meat items such as briskets, pork butts, ribeye roasts and other items good for grilling or smoking whole.

O'Connor's is owned by Bill Ringsdorf and Jeanie O'Connor Ringsdorf, longtime community residents, members of Hopewell United Methodist Church, and in Bill's case, a 1987 graduate of Downingtown High School. Both Bill and Jeanie have spent their careers in food service and restaurant management and opened the store after seeing the need in the community with the absence of both large and small grocery stores serving East Brandywine Township.

Baby Eagles

Eaglets have a hard battle. Generally, a pair of nesting eagles produce 1-3 eggs per year. It is estimated that 50% of all eaglets die in their first year, and only 20% reach full maturity. According to Sandy Moser, East Brandywine Township's Eagle Nest Monitor for the Game Commission, over the past four years, the local nest has seen one eaglet fledge (fly) in 2014, and two eaglets fledge this year. In 2013, an eaglet died due to a fall from the nest before it could fly. In 2015, the nest was knocked down in January due to high winds. Though the eagles rebuilt the nest, and showed signs of new egg(s) by closely protecting the nest through the cold and snow of March — they were attacked by three intruding bald eagles most likely looking to steal their nest. The East Brandywine eagles were able to chase away the intruders, but they stopped closely protecting the nest, signaling a "failed nest."

The exact location of the nest is not disclosed in this article as a courtesy to the nearby homeowners as well as the eagles themselves, who can be disturbed by throngs of sightseers. If you happen upon eagles (young or old), you should not approach them even if they appear injured. Their talons are very strong, and if they grab you, you may not be able to get free. You can contact the **East Brandywine Township Police Department at (610) 269-4300** to make sure an injured eagle gets proper care dispatched.

DASD the Only School District in Chester County Not to Raise Property Taxes in 2016-17

AS REPORTED IN the *Daily Local* on June 11, 2016, the Downingtown Area School District (DASD) was the only one of twelve school districts in Chester County to leave property taxes unchanged for the forthcoming fiscal year. According to the *Daily Local*, 2016-17 will be the fourth consecutive year in which DASD taxpayers will enjoy a zero percent increase in their property tax. Still, DASD will have the second highest school budget next year which, at \$210.7 million, dwarfs most other school budgets in the County. West Chester School District has the largest budget at \$237.4 million and Coatesville is #3, at \$153.2 million.



The decision to raise taxes or keep them the same is not, *a priori*, a good or bad idea. Many factors enter into what is a very complex process. *Milemarker* contacted Carl Croft, East Brandywine representative to the DASD School Board, for input into the decision making process. Croft first stated that the decision not to raise taxes does not mean that tax revenues remain stagnant since new homeowners and new businesses add to the tax base each year. Most important though was his contention that the Board manages all phases of the District's expenditures, scrutinizing each funding request to make sure that the spending contributes to a high level of education for DASD students. Toward that end, he indicated that the School District has updated all major curricula, including math, social studies, reading, science and engineering. In addition, DASD will be adding dozens of advanced placement courses in the Fall of 2016, and every student will be issued a laptop in the Fall of 2017.

Croft also emphasized that the Board manages its capital budget to avoid large swings in spending that come with non-recurring capital investments. In February, 2016 the Board adopted a 5-year capital budget for spending on facility improvements, information technology, security services, and general services. With such foresight, the Board can avoid large "surprise" expenses which, in the case of many school districts, lead to "surprise" tax increases. The Board has retired \$45,000,000 in debt in recent years and has established a debt service reserve fund for another \$30,000,000 in debt. This reduced debt service costs by \$3,500,000 over the last three years.

On the revenue side, Croft mentioned several other factors which have helped to keep a lid on tax increases. In addition to new homes and commercial enterprises, DASD has been reviewing property assessments to make sure that undervalued properties are adjusted to the right valuations so that the owners pay the appropriate amount of property taxes. Another factor that has helped is that, according to Croft, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has restored all of the funding reductions from 2010 which were caused by the expiration of the Federal Government's stimulus plan.

Milemarker asked Croft about building activity in the District and, specifically, construction in East Brandywine which can also lead to changes in the District's budget. Although new homes lead to new taxpayers they also lead to new children that need to be educated. With East Brandywine being one of the fastest growing townships in Pennsylvania, we wanted to know how the District handles the influx of children. Croft had extensive statistics to show that the Board tracks how many homes are being built, where they are built, and when they will be available for occupation. The Table above shows the planned communities for East Brandywine over the next five years.

According to Croft, each new home, with the possible exception of retirement homes, adds an average of 0.53 students to the school district. Across the entire school district, there may be an average of about 200 homes added each year during expansionary times, a trend that obviously cannot last forever. The trick is to anticipate where the homes will be built and allocate resources in that direction. East Brandywine has been a pocket of volatility due to its rapid expansion over the past seven years. Clearly, the School Board cannot control where or how quickly houses will be built. At times communities are planned, applied for, and approved by the Board of Supervisors, but may or may not proceed to construction as per the business needs of the builder. This is the case with the Hillendale Community shown above which may start construction immediately or be postponed for years. Because of this unpredictability, the School Board finds itself in situations beyond its control which lead to redistricting students since the school which is closest to their homes may be at capacity when the new home is built. This happened at Brandywine-Wallace Elementary in 2016-2017 as some students were redistricted to Springton Manor.

In summary, the taxpayers of East Brandywine Township have benefitted in recent years from static property tax bills which, in turn, have been enabled by a prudent and conservative School Board in the larger Downingtown School District. Having said that, the recent era of low inflation cannot endure forever and sound management practice can only take us so far. As the saying goes, there are two sure things: death and taxes, or maybe more appropriately, death and higher taxes. So, one day, your property taxes will go up. But thanks to a well-Crofted plan (misspelling intended), there will be no higher taxes this year.

Township Tidbits

TOWN TOURS & VILLAGE WALKS

OSBORNE ROAD BRIDGE REPLACEMENT

THIS UPGRADE WAS expected to be completed by June 30th, but was delayed, as engineers have struggled with how to deliver the new bridge to the site. Low wires make it impractical to deliver from Route 340, so they now expect to back 2 tractor trailers down Osborne Road from 322, then unload and position the bridge using the 500-ton crane. A total of 8 bridge pieces will be delivered to the site. The Township will be communicating with residents who may be inconvenienced by this activity as the timing becomes more certain.

HOPEWELL ROAD PHARMACY

THE BOARD OF Supervisors granted final plan approval to Hopewell Road Pharmacy with conditions. Tony Scalies, Pharmacist, hopes to complete the needed improvements to the lot on the corner of Hopewell Road and Route 322 as soon as possible and begin to serve the community.

INCREASED ENFORCEMENT

THE STATE OF Pennsylvania has identified Route 322 between Bollinger Road and North Buck Road as a problem area for aggressive driving. It was identified based on contributing factors in submitted accident reports such as speeding, following too closely, and improper lane changes. Residents should expect to see increased police enforcement along this stretch of Route 322 based on grant funding from the State.

HILLENDALE DEVELOPMENT

THIS 211 UNIT development, including a mix of townhomes and small family homes, has been on hold since 2008. In June of 2016, Metropolitan Development Group performed due diligence and agreed to purchase the project from Southdown Homes. Township officials expect the project, which has already been approved, to begin construction activity later this summer. The project will include renovation of 2 historic homes, and a connector road between Creek Road (Rt. 282) and Township Road, with estimated completion in 2017.

BEWARE OF SOLICITORS

ANYONE TRYING TO sell door-to-door in East Brandywine must get a permit from the Township. If you see suspicious activity, contact the Police Department immediately. This Spring, police confronted two illegal solicitors using aggressive tactics while attempting to sell meat to residents out of the back of white rental vans. They displayed magnetic signs saying “The Meat Shoppe” and “Capital Meats”. These companies have been warned by other Police agencies in the area, but continue to solicit illegally.
