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## Township Firefighters Need You!

**A**S TOWNSHIP residents, we all count on East Brandywine Fire Company (EBFC) to respond when needed. Yet we sometimes forget that these dedicated VOLUNTEERS also rely on us to help them provide the excellent service we have come to expect. In 2013, our Township benefited from over FIVE THOUSAND HOURS of volunteer service from our firefighters and EMS personnel. The crews responded to over 817 emergency calls (about 55% for emergency medical service and 45% for fire emergencies). Nationwide, the volume of fire department calls has nearly TRIPLED in the last 25 years.

We can be proud of the 40+ dedicated volunteers at East Brandywine Fire Company. Because of the disruptive nature of calls to the first responders (who all have full time jobs to pay the bills), many fire companies have difficulty staffing their operations. But EBFC draws volunteers from many neighboring municipalities because of the camaraderie and high quality work environment. Over half the EBFC volunteers come from outside East Brandywine Township. In fact, Pennsylvania ranks EBFC among the top 3% of 2,153 fire companies statewide, based on training at least 75% of its members to National Professional Qualifications Standards.

Being a firefighter is a real commitment of time and energy. The Fire Company holds weekly training sessions for its responders. Plus, our volunteers trained over 2,000 elementary school children in fire safety during 2013, and over 500 families turned out for the Fire Prevention Open House. The volunteers also participated in over 20 community events giving even more of their time to serve our residents. These

## Township Firefighters Need You!

volunteers are our friends and neighbors — who make themselves available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, through every holiday. And after September 11, 2001, the role of emergency services expanded greatly. Volunteer firefighters are extremely dedicated to providing this public service. It is estimated that volunteer firefighters save American taxpayers \$37 billion per year that can be reinvested in each community's infrastructure, social and other community programs, and reduced tax burden.

Across Pennsylvania, volunteer fire companies are struggling with funding and volunteers — both are more and more difficult to come by. Many municipalities are having discussions on how to support these important community services that are too important to lose. Relying on neighboring fire companies would significantly increase response times and could cost lives. Moving to a paid fire service could cost our Township well over a million dollars annually. Most townships are concluding that they need to find ways to support the existing emergency service organizations.

East Brandywine is no exception. While EBFC is a 100% volunteer fire company, there are still many expenses. The 2014 budget shows total planned expenditures of about \$350,000. Almost 56% of this budget is dedicated to costs of obtaining and maintaining the Engine, Ladder and other key apparatus. Another 16% goes to paying for the building and grounds expenses. About 7% pays insurance bills. This leaves only 20% of the budget to pay for administrative fees (such as accounting and legal), fundraising expense for the annual mailing, uniforms, training and other miscellaneous expenses. In 2014, EBFC expects contributions from Federal, State and Local governments to cover about 45% of their expenses. But they rely on the voluntary contributions of our residents to fund most of the remainder. Please consider ways you can help (see "Support EBFC" on page 1).

## POLICE DEPARTMENT GOES HIGH TECH

The East Brandywine Township Police Department is completing its pilot program to use secured wireless internet access in each Patrol Vehicle to enhance the type and quality of information provided to the Patrol Officer in the field, and moving forward with full deployment in each vehicle.

Building on the existing County provided Mobile Data Terminal (MDT), AT+T Wireless Data cards and specialized software have been integrated to provide safe, secure access to various law enforcement databases from each car, as well as complete access to the department's software used to record incidents and crimes. Each MDT now has the ability to connect back to the Police Department's record management system and allows the officer in the car the chance to fill out his/her incidents, arrests and research past information, as if they were using a wired PC at the station. Officers can also print out reports, photos, and perform real time lookup of driver license info and other state wide databases queries from the vehicle.

"Officers using this solution in the vehicles can access the same suite of software and law enforcement tools that are available to them at the police station, including Email and specialized law enforcement websites, with no learning curve involved" indicated Norman Wallace, Owner of Kipper Consulting Co., the Police Department's Information Technology contractor.

Prior to implementing this technology, officers were required to return to the police station and complete numerous forms and incident reports after leaving

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## Downingtown Library Growing to Serve Area Residents

**T**HE DOWNINGTOWN Library was first established in 1829 as a private collection to serve member families. It has been housed in three different locations since that time as usage has grown. In 1961, the Downingtown Library became a member of the Chester County Library System. The Library has been located at its current location at 330 East Lancaster Avenue since 1914.

Once again, the Library is moving forward to serve the growing area population. For example, East Brandywine Township, whose residents account for 40% of Downingtown Library cardholders, is now the 2<sup>nd</sup> fastest growing township in Pennsylvania.

The library has already broken ground to upgrade their next home at 122 Wallace Avenue in Downingtown (adjacent to Kerr Park, see architect's rendering above). The new facility will provide:

- Handicapped accessibility in compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act
- Additional rooms for programs, educational services and tutoring
- Additional computer workstations and wireless connectivity
- Expanded work and reading areas.
- Adequate parking and a drive-up book drop.

The Library is a critically important resource for the community. It serves more than 109,000 visitors per year, provides Internet access for the 25% of area residents without at-home service, hosts educational programs for more than 400 local teens, and aids over 500 adults with educational programs or access to vital information on health and human services.

Downingtown Library needs your support to make this project into a reality for area residents. ## Infrastructure Work Continues

**R**ESIDENTS WILL notice several improvement projects commencing on area bridges and roads. Dorlans Mill Road Bridge is expected to be closed from June 23rd through sometime in September to repair the defects in the bridge. When it reopens, it should be back to a two lane bridge as it was until fall of 2013. Construction on a new bridge at the bottom of Osborne Road is expected to start near the end of 2014, and continue into early 2015. While this will solve the weight limit problems where trucks have damaged the bridge many times in recent years, the roadway above the bridge (in Caln Township) is still not appropriate for heavy trucks. Both Brandywine and Caln Townships (the bridge is the major connector between these townships) are working to continue to limit the use of Osborne Road by trucks. Some of the major GPS map companies have agreed to mark Osborne Road so trucks will not use this as a shortcut in future releases of their maps. Also, Brandywine Township officials are working with local residents to try to address a storm water runoff issue that caused icing on Osborne Road last winter.

At a recent township meeting, a local resident reported that PennDOT has been notifying residents of their plan to replace the aging bridge on Little Washington Road near Evergreen Road with work beginning as early as this fall. Residents have expressed concern that the plans today do NOT address the significant flooding that occurs in this area during heavy storm water runoff.

Significant upgrades are planned at the corner of Route 322 and Bollinger Road. PennDOT has given conditional approval to widen the road for appropriate turn lanes, and to add a traffic signal. Pulte Homes is finalizing plans for final approval, and expects to start road work in 2015.

And finally, Pennsylvania has been ranked as one of the seven most at-risk states for sink-holes. Local residents may have noticed the traffic trouble when a major sinkhole closed eastbound lanes of the Route 30 Bypass in Exton for over eight hours this spring. According to PennDOT, this was caused by several holes in a drainage pipe allowing water to leak and creating voids in the road's subsurface.

the scene. This solution allows them to remain out on patrol and choose the location and time to complete this process, while remaining available and accessible to citizens.

In addition to the patrol vehicles, Department Investigators have also been equipped with a wireless hotspot which allows them to connect computer devices to the Department's databases from crime scenes and other investigation locations.

"We've implemented a very robust, secure method to get needed information out to the officers while providing in the field technologies that make the Officer's jobs more time and cost efficient. This effort reinforces to me their commitment to be progressive and use every tool available to help keep the Township and its residents safe and secure." stated Wallace.



## Brandywine Conservancy Plants 25,000<sup>th</sup> tree

**T**HE BRANDYWINE Conservancy ([www.brandywine.org](http://www.brandywine.org)) Reforestation Campaign achieved its five-year goal by planting its 25,000<sup>th</sup> tree on April 19, 2014. The Conservancy planted 600 native trees along the East Branch of the Brandywine Creek at a property owned by East Brandywine Township. Native hardwood tree species included redbud, serviceberry, red-twig dogwood, sweetbay magnolia, sycamore, red maple, silver maple, and swamp white oak.

### HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE OF FORESTS IN THE BRANDYWINE WATERSHED

Forests historically covered well over 90 percent of the landscape within the watershed. This forest cover protected the soil, keeping storm water from washing it away. Old growth trees and subsequent biological diversity gave the watershed balance and virtually pristine water quality. As the Brandywine Watershed developed, development removed forests, resulting in forested land now comprising only about 28% of the current watershed. As a result, 40% of the Brandywine Creek's stream miles show substantial deterioration today.

In short, reforesting the watershed is an excellent way to restore water quality. In particular, reforesting steep slopes and riparian areas (strips of land immediately adjacent to a stream) are targeted in the Conservancy's Campaign because these specific areas are especially vulnerable to erosion and, when reforested, prevent sedimentation and can filter out pollutants from entering waterways. The Conservancy's Reforestation Campaign allows forests to carry out tasks that are vital to the ecosystem and to the health of our waters.

### CONSERVANCY SETS AMBITIOUS GOAL: 50 BY 50 REFORESTATION CAMPAIGN

An additional 6,000 trees will be planted at multiple sites in the spring and fall of 2014 with the support of volunteers and funds from various grant sources. The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society continues to be a primary source of funding in the campaign. "The PHS-Plant One Million campaign, a three state, 13 county initiative to reforest urban and community forests, supports Brandywine Conservancy in their tree planting effort through our TreeVitalize Watersheds grant program and are excited to celebrate their 25,000th tree planted," said Emma Melvin, Plant One Million Regional Project Manager.

Building on the Reforestation Campaign's success, the Conservancy has announced an expanded goal "50 by 50," to plant 50,000 trees by the Conservancy's 50th anniversary in 2017. The 50 by 50 Campaign allows the Conservancy to further the impact of our targeted water quality improvement. Additionally, the Conservancy continues to hope to inspire additional projects through the visibility and educational opportunity that each reforestation site provides.

## Historic Dowlin Forge

**Y**OU MAY wonder where “Dowlin Forge” comes from. You can see the historic remains along the Struble Trail at the intersection with Dowlin Forge Road. A plaque gives the following history:

“Before you lie the ruins of the Dowlin Forge, known as the Mary Ann Forge when it was established in 1785. A forerunner of the steel industry, forges such as this were in abundance in southeastern Pennsylvania, with thirty-seven in existence in 1791. This iron forge was active for nearly 100 years.



Water was diverted from the adjacent Brandywine Creek into the raceway (still evident) to the water wheels at the sides of the forge. Three fires, fueled by charcoal and two trip hammers, powered by water, pounded out the impurities in the pig iron. Further refining produced the bar iron needed to make such items as scythes, sickles, saw blades and horseshoe iron. Mary Ann Forge was the earliest industrial site in Uwchlan Township. In 1801, John Dowlin purchased the forge beginning three generations of ownership. The community that developed around the forge (including saw mill, grist mill, blacksmith, charcoal hearths, produce farm, boarding houses, railroad stop, dwellings, school and company store) became known as Dowlin Forge.”
