CURBSIDE TRASH

**PICKUP DATE HAS
MOVED FROM
TUESDAY TO THURSDAY!**

There have been some important changes in East Brandywine Township's Trash and Recycling programs.

1. The Township's municipal waste hauler has changed from A.J. Blosenski to Republic Services.
2. Curbside trash and recycling pickup has been changed from Tuesday to Thursday. Your pickup time may change so trash should be out by 5:30 a.m. for pickup during the day on Thursday.
3. Recycling collection has been changed from dual-stream to single-stream. This means you no longer have to separate paper from glass and plastics. You may continue to use your current recycling containers (they will eventually be replaced with larger single containers for all recycling materials).

Township Guide on How to Handle the White Stuff



EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP takes great pride in its ability to quickly and safely clear snow from the Township's many miles of roadways. The Township also coordinates with PennDOT and private road owners to insure that all roads in the township are cleared during major snow events. Township residents play a key role in the Township's snow removal. Please keep these handy guidelines available.

BEFORE THE SNOW FALLS

Make sure the front of your mailbox is at least four to six inches behind the front of the curb (or edge of the road) and mounted at a height of four feet. Mailboxes closer to the curb and lower to the ground are most likely to be damaged by the weight of snow being pushed from a plow. Take time to make sure your mailbox is sturdy enough to withstand the weight of snow being pushed into it. Make sure to clear any existing snow from all walkways, stairs and paths to mailboxes.

Trim tree branches hanging over the road.

All tree limbs, shrubs, etc. that protrude into a roadway must be cleared by the property owners of the trees. Trees may not extend closer than a distance of three feet from the road and fifteen feet up.

Around the Township

GEORGE HOLMES

Around the Township is an ongoing series of feature articles about Township residents or employees.



MANY EAST BRANDYWINE residents will recognize George Holmes as a very active member of the community. George is Editor Emeritus of the East Brandywine Township newsletter, *The Milemarker*, after his volunteer service from 2002-2013. He began writing for *The Milemarker* because he saw the need for useful information in our fast-growing community. He took on *The Milemarker* with three goals:

1. To inform busy Township residents about important local goings-on.
2. To help instill a sense of community in the Township—delivering a single newsletter to all residents to foster discussion and knowledge.
3. Personally, George hoped to meet interesting people in the pursuit of his duties.

The first two goals remain important guideposts for *The Milemarker* today. On George’s third goal, he reports that his expectations were vastly surpassed as he met so many interesting people through his volunteer work.

George was born and raised in Ireland by a family of farmers. After graduation with a degree in modern languages from Dublin University, he began an international career in journalism. He worked as a reporter and editor for leading newspapers in Ireland (*The Irish Times*), England (*The Guardian*), Canada (*The Toronto Globe & Mail*) and the U.S. (*The Wall Street Journal* and other publications). As the Editor of a trade journal for the gem and jewel industry, he earned national awards for editorial excellence and helped to launch the industry’s trade show in Las Vegas in 1991.

He originally moved to the Philadelphia area in the early 1960’s when he joined the reporting staff of the *Wall Street Journal’s* Philadelphia Bureau. He married Debbie, his beloved wife and a native of Chadds Ford in 1971. They moved from Philadelphia to Malvern, and to East Brandywine Township in 1979. They share enthusiasm for gardening and the outdoors, hiking often over the years at favorite national parks such as Banff and Yoho in Canada, Acadia in Maine, and Saguaro and Chiricahua in Arizona.

Since retiring, they have been active community volunteers. They helped found and were members of the Township’s Open Space Committee. They also delivered Meals on Wheels in Chester County for many years. George handled consumer inquiries in the Better Business Bureau’s Lancaster office for two years.

From the Board of Supervisors, the Township Manager, the Township staff, and from those who read his articles—we extend a hearty “thank you” to George Holmes.

Snow Removal Guidelines



Consider installing driveway markers. If your property does not have a curb or other method to delineate the edge of the street, orange driveway markers, available at home repair stores, can help plow drivers avoid damage to your property.

Keep culs-de-sac and roads free of parked cars from the time snow starts until the roads are cleared. In the case of steep driveways, park at the mouth of the drive, but off the road. If a car is parked on a roadside or cul-de-sac, we may not finish plowing that street, or may return several hours or even the next day to complete the work. Cars parked illegally or on Snow Emergency Routes are subject to towing and/or ticketing.

WHILE ROADS ARE BEING PLOWED
Do not place shoveled, blown, or plowed snow from driveways, sidewalks or parking lots onto public streets. This is extremely dangerous for vehicles on the road.

Guide for shoveling



When shoveling your driveway, leave the last six feet of your drive unshoveled until street plowing is complete.

This unshoveled part will allow the snow being pushed by the plow to remain on the plow and not dumped into your drive. If you must shovel out your drive, clear a six foot area of the road that is directly in front of the mouth of your drive. In addition clear an area ten feet before and after the mouth of your drive, so that when the plow comes through, it will unload snow that it is pushing into the cleared area and not in the mouth of your driveway. Use FIGURE 1 as a guide for shoveling before roadways have been cleared.


Be Patient. Snow removal does take time, especially in cases of icing and/or heavy snowfall. The Township (as well as PennDOT) will usually plow potentially dangerous and heavily travelled areas first. Drivers begin one pass in each direction on streets and one pass into and out of cul-de-sacs. Plowing

may not be finished on the initial pass, but may be completed several hours later or even the next day. Any residual snow will be pushed back from streets when the storm has ended.

Note that East Brandywine Township does not clear all streets within the Township. Responsibility for plowing specific roads is shown on FIGURE 2.

AFTER ROADS HAVE BEEN PLOWED
Report any problems to East Brandywine Township at (610) 269-8230 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays through Fridays. Please leave your name, address, phone number and the nature of the problem. Calls received after 3 p.m., on the weekends, or during snow emergencies may not be acted upon until the next business day. On Saturdays, Sundays or after 5 p.m., emergencies may be reported to the Chester County Police Dispatch at (610) 383-7000.

EAST-WEST TRAIL STUDY

East Brandywine Township is collaborating with the Brandywine Conservancy to study the feasibility of building an East-West trail from the Struble Trail to the Community Park as shown on the township's Official Map with an extension to the western boundary of the Township. This project is an important part of the Brandywine Creek Greenway and the proposed trail will provide residents with a safe place to walk or bicycle from Marsh Creek State Park in the east to Hibernia County Park in the west.

The Conservancy is in the process of preparing maps that illustrate locations of existing trails and trail easements, potential trail locations, and potential neighborhood connections. The maps will be on display at a public presentation that is scheduled for Tuesday, March 10th at 7 p.m. in the municipal building. All are welcome and encouraged to attend and provide comments. The next phase of the project will include facilitating community workshops to focus on the vision for the Dowlin Forge Road Trail. The workshops will educate residents about the Brandywine Creek Greenway, trails and trail planning, build community support for trails, solicit ideas for branding the trail, explore alternative trail routes, and recruit volunteers for the ongoing project. Currently, this follow-on phase has not received funding.

Tax Millage Expected to Decrease from 2.75 to 2.60

East Brandywine Township to adopt 2015 budget.

ANYONE WHO HAS done a budget—from family spending to multi-million dollar corporate planning—knows what a daunting task it is to plan for the coming year's spending. The process requires difficult tradeoffs when the list of worthy projects inevitably exceeds the available funding.

East Brandywine Township officials have been working long and hard to find the right balance in the 2015 budget for the Township, currently expected to be approximately \$5.2 million. Both staff and Township Supervisors (Hudson Voltz, Jay Fischer and Arnold Kring) share a strong belief that they are trusted custodians of the important duties vested in the Township. But they also know that tax revenue comes from hard-earned dollars provided by hard-working township residents.

This year, the Township Supervisors noted that they are proud to be able to REDUCE the assessed tax millage from 2.75 to 2.60, a reduction of approximately 5.4%. They have been able to reduce the tax rate WITHOUT any significant cuts to service. Hudson Voltz, Chairman of the Township Board of Supervisors says, "We are constantly looking for ways to do more with less. We fully recognize the important role we play in supporting our township residents in the most efficient and effective ways possible."

2015 is the first year that the township has separated its Operating Budget and Capital Budget. This allows increased visibility into planned capital projects within the Township. For example, the following roads are slotted for Base Repair & Overlay: Locust Knoll Development, Wooded Acres Development, Hawthorne Drive and Hilltop Drive. Blakely Road is scheduled for Helm to cul-de-sac repair and overlay.

EMERGENCY GENERATORS

East Brandywine Township was notified that a grant for emergency generators to power the Township's traffic signals during extended power outages was approved. The funding source is the federal Department of Homeland Security. Modifications to two traffic signal locations are necessary to allow the connection of the generator to the signals, and one location will be modified with LED lights so the unit uses less energy.

Bondsville Mill Park Grand Opening Planned for Spring

BONDSVILLE MILL PARK, located at 1647 Bondsville Rd, has opened as a passive historical and nature park comprising 47 acres of natural woodland and Beaver Creek frontage, with interesting views of the original historic mill buildings and mill race, providing a unique glimpse into the Township's early history. The site was established as a grist mill around 1732, but was rebuilt as a textile mill in the 1840s by Abraham Bond, starting the mill configuration that you see there today.


While the park is now open to the public, the formal grand opening ceremony is being planned for April 2015—watch WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG for details.

The Mill property of 22 acres was acquired by the Township in 2004 with Open Space funds and was subsequently increased with the acquisition of a further 25 acres with significant support coming from a DCNR Grant. Further, a PECO Green Region Grant administered through the Natural Lands Trust provided funds for the packed gravel trail.

Work on clearing the collapsed buildings and stabilizing the buildings has been ongoing for years by a small group of volunteers with financial support from the Township. Work continues to expand the trails network and on stabilizing and preserving the structures to make them safe for close examination by the public sometime in the future.

Bondsville Mill Park is a valuable addition to the Township's recreational facilities, offering a mile of constructed hiking trails with a compacted gravel loop around the mill buildings and along the Beaver Creek, a nature trail up to the water tower and a loop to the north of the property through old spruce, maple and oak forest. Plans are in place to extend a trail to the South along the Beaver Creek, as well as to the Southeast to provide observation points in the wetlands of the Park.

The entrance to the Park is over the bridge from the parking area located at 1647 Bondsville Rd. A brief history of the Bondsville Mill and Village is provided, making a visit to the Park an interesting historical experience as well as a great op-



portunity for some exercise. Also at the entrance to the Park is a war memorial erected in honor of mill employees who served, and those who died, during the Second World War.

The park is open from sunrise to sunset. There is no hunting or trapping allowed and dogs must be leashed. Bicycles and ATVs are not allowed.

New Connector Road Coming?

EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP recently entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Carlino East Brandywine, L.P. (“Carlino”), to ensure that an anticipated commercial development in the community is built with the best possible plan for growing traffic volume. The Memorandum anticipates that Carlino would build a new public connector road from Horseshoe Pike to North Guthriesville Road immediately West of the Brandywine Village Shopping Center (home to Stauffer’s Market, Burger King and other retail establishments).


Carlino is the equitable owner of an undeveloped tract of land located at 1279 Horseshoe Pike in East Brandywine Township, just west of the Brandywine Village Shopping Center. Carlino intends to improve the property as a mixed-use commercial development, currently expected to feature a Giant Food Store as an anchor tenant. The new Connector Road would be necessary to support existing volume of traffic and traffic projected to be generated by the new growth and development in the Township. The road would terminate on Route 322 near the existing traffic signal.

Construction of the new Connector Road will traverse portions of Carlino’s undeveloped tract of land, as well as portions of land in two other adjacent tracts of land. Extended negotiations among all the involved parties were unable to reach an agreement that would allow the Connector Road to proceed. The Township therefore has exercised its power of eminent domain to acquire the required land and to adjust certain easements as necessary for the public purpose of constructing the public roadway.

All costs for the legal proceedings necessary for the exercise of eminent domain, along with all construction costs, will be paid by Carlino. Carlino will also bear any costs if the owners of the property subject to acquisition through eminent domain should bring suit against the Township, Board or any other Township officials directly related to this action.

So, while there are many issues still to be finalized, the Township has entered into a binding Memorandum of Understanding to begin the process. The Milemarker will bring you more as the project unfolds.

POLICE COMMENDATION

Officer Jeff Yankanich was awarded a Valor Commendation by the Township Board of Supervisors and Police Chief Kocsi for his actions on November 3, 2014. On that Monday night, Officer Yankanich was the first to respond to the report of a shooting at the Hurley Road YMCA in West Brandywine Township.

Yankanich observed an armed suspect kneeling over a motionless body lying in the parking lot, and exited his vehicle in a position of cover to engage the suspect with commands. He immediately noticed a female crouched down between two vehicles and directly in the line of fire. While placing himself in danger of serious bodily injury or death, Yankanich moved from his position of cover and worked his way towards the female in an effort to protect her, while continuing to focus on and engage the armed suspect.

It was at this point that the suspect took his own life. Officer Yankanich's actions were both heroic and courageous, and he was awarded this Valor Commendation for an exemplary job well done.
