## PUBLIC MEETING

### PROPOSED EAST-WEST TRAIL

CONNECTING STRUBLE TRAIL  
TO HIBERNIA COUNTY PARK

East Brandywine Township hosted an open public meeting on March 10, 2015, to review the results of initial concept phase work on an East-West Trail, running from the Struble Trail near Dowlin Forge Road to Hibernia County Park. Much of the initial concept phase work was done with support from the Brandywine Conservancy under their Brandywine Creek Greenway ("BCG") initiative. The BCG is a regional initiative of the Brandywine Conservancy and twenty-four municipalities. It establishes a vision for a major corridor to link over 230 miles of existing and planned trails (see [www.brandywinegreenway.org](http://www.brandywinegreenway.org)). At the public meeting, a vision was discussed that proposed a new trail.

- The trail would begin at the planned Helen and Robert Whittaker Memorial Trailhead Park to be located at the corner of Dowlin Forge Road and Creek Road, and connecting this spur to the Struble Trail.

## East Brandywine Township Pride in Local Bald Eagle Nest

*Local Birds Face High Winds and Fierce Intruders*

**T**HERE ARE FEW sights more thrilling than a bald eagle. The bald eagle is both the national bird and the national animal of the United States, appears prominently on the Great Seal of the United States, and is exclusively a bird of North America. Eagles generally lay 1-3 eggs which must be incubated for about 35 days—mostly in March or early April, when cold and snow are still quite common and the parents must be very vigilant in keeping the eggs warm and protected.

East Brandywine Township has been the proud home of a pair of nesting eagles for the last three years. According to Sandy Moser, East Brandywine Township's Eagle Nest Monitor for the Game Commission, this pair has found both success and difficulty in their Township home. In 2013, they hatched a live eaglet, which unfortunately died due to a fall from the nest before it was mature enough to fly. In 2014, an eaglet was successfully raised and the parents pushed it from the nest that fall. It will be at least 4 years before

## Around the Township

### EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY

*Around the Township is an ongoing series of feature articles about Township residents, volunteers, and employees.*

**T**HE EAST BRANDYWINE Township Municipal Authority (MA) was established by the Board of Supervisors in 1999 to help protect and ensure the availability of water resources in the Township, and to oversee construction and operation of community wastewater treatment and disposal facilities. The MA recognizes the importance of groundwater recharge and stream preservation and its impact to the future of East Brandywine residents.

In East Brandywine, all approved developments requiring public sewerage must provide land within the Township so that the treated water can be recharged. For instance, the treated wastewater in the Applecross community is recharged to irrigate the golf course via drip and spray irrigation. Since the majority of East Brandywine Township’s residents have individual wells, it is of critical importance that our water remain in in the Township and not be discharged into creeks to be carried away downstream. The importance of disposal of wastewater through groundwater recharge is innovative, and its significance to future generations is immeasurable. The Municipal Authority currently operates and maintains two wastewater treatment plants serving nearly 750 customers in the communities of Keats Glen (including the Delaware County Community College), Hopewell, the Village of Guthriesville, and Applecross.

Municipal Authority members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and serve five year terms. Mike Corbin, Dave Summers, and Sandy Moser were original members and remain active members today. Gerry Kirkpatrick and Joe Anthony, who were also original members, served for over a decade and helped establish the solid foundation upon which the MA continues to grow. Steve Alexander served briefly before a new business venture required more of his time. The newest members of the MA are Ray Crossan and Dave Whelihan. Both Ray and Dave are experienced in geotechnical and environmental engineering and will be great assets to the Authority. Ray also brings a first-hand knowledge of the local planning process as a former member of the Planning Commission.

## New Bondsville Mill Park

*Don't Miss Visiting this New Local Treasure!*

**DON'T MISS THE** chance to take a fascinating walk through East Brandywine Township's newest addition to the local park system, Bondsville Mill Park. It's close by and easy to find. From Route 322, follow Bondsville Road past the Fire Hall, then take your first **LEFT** turn to remain on Bondsville Road. You will see a parking area just a short drive further on the left side of the road (1647 Bondsville Rd).

While the mill ruins are fenced off as too dangerous for hands-on exploring, visitors can get within just several feet of the mill, and see all the detail of the remaining infrastructure. The park offers a ¼ mile compacted gravel loop trail around the mill buildings and along Beaver Creek. There is also a nature trail up to the water tower and a loop to the north of the property through old spruce, maple and oak forest, which total ¾ mile in length.

Excellent signage show the history and the layout of the park. An abbreviated history for our readers:

- Several grist mills were on or near this site since the 1800's.
- In 1842, Abraham Bond purchased the mill and converted it to a textile factory, producing Kentucky Jeans and establishing the small factory village of Bondsville.
- In 1848, William D. MacFarland purchased the mill and during the Civil War produced uniforms for Union soldiers.
- By 1870 the mill was powered by water (est. 16 hp) and steam (est. 18 hp).
- In 1927, the Collins & Aikman Corp. purchased the property and produced automobile upholstery cloth. They devoted "virtually all" efforts to supplying materials for the armed forces during WWII.
- After WWII, the mill produced a variety of textiles. In 1960, production stopped and the facility was used as a warehouse. It finally closed in 1965 as it fell into disrepair and some of the buildings collapsed.
- In 2004, East Brandywine Township acquired the mill using open space funds. Since then, work has been ongoing by a small, dedicated group of volunteers, culminating in the Park's official opening on June 9, 2015 at 4 PM!

The park is open from sunrise to sunset. Visitors are encouraged to enjoy the park, but stay clear of all buildings and fenced areas. No bicycles, ATVs, hunting or trapping are allowed, and dogs must be leashed.

## East-West Trail

- The trail would continue westerly along Dowlin Forge Road (residents may have noticed part of this segment of the trail has already been completed during some new construction in the area).
- The trail would then cross Rock Raymond Road, traversing westerly through undeveloped land to Batten Drive.
- The trail might then go directly to Hopewell Road, or curve around to N Buck Road then to Hopewell Road.
- It is proposed to enter Echo Dell Road, then bear left on Pancoast Lane.
- It is proposed to exit the end of Pancoast Lane along an emergency access easement to Corner Ketch Road.
- Across Corner Ketch Road, it could continue along a trail easement then along property of Brandywine Wallace School, reaching the East Brandywine Township Community Park.
- From the Community Park, the Concept Plan suggests two possible routes toward the border with West Brandywine Township, one Northerly, and one Southerly.

The next steps will be to apply for a Chester County VPP Grant to fund a feasibility study to determine if all the appropriate easements and accesses can be obtained, and to determine a cost for building the trail. This will need to be coordinated with West Brandywine Township to determine whether the Northerly or Southerly routes for the trail are more suitable. East Brandywine Township is establishing a volunteer committee to lead this effort, with the ongoing help of the Brandywine Conservancy.

## Police Commendations

*Corporal Twaddell, Officer Shephard, and Officer Yankanich*

### CORPORAL TWADDELL AND OFFICER SHEPHARD

#### UNIT COMMENDATIONS

**U**WERE presented to Corporal Mark Twaddell and Officer Beau Shephard by the Township Board of Supervisors and Police Chief Mark Kocsi for their actions on the night of February 25, 2015. On that Wednesday night, Corporal Twaddell was on routine patrol in the Brandywine Village Shopping Center conducting business checks. He detected a strong odor of smoke, and upon exiting his vehicle discovered heavy smoke coming from the roof area of the China Moon Restaurant. Closer inspection revealed that the restaurant interior was also full of smoke. Corporal Twaddell immediately called for the Fire Company and requested Officer Beau Shephard's assistance.

While Corporal Twaddell and Officer Shephard stood by and monitored the situation, they suddenly saw flames ignite near the kitchen area of the restaurant. Fearing the flames would quickly spread and possibly engulf other stores, they made the decision to break the glass door and enter the restaurant in an attempt to knock down the flames with fire extinguishers. Their courageous efforts were successful. Upon closer inspection by the Fire Company, it was found that food had been left on the stoves and had begun to smolder. China Moon was able to clean up and reopen for business the same day.

Corporal Twaddell's keen observations and the quick actions by both he and Officer Shephard are directly responsible for preventing a structure fire that may have caused substantial damage to China Moon Restaurant and other businesses. They are commended for an exemplary job well done!

### OFFICER JEFF YANKANICH

A Merit Commendation was awarded to Officer Jeff Yankanich by the Township Board of Supervisors and Police Chief Mark Kocsi for his actions on Tuesday, January 27, 2015. East Brandywine Police Officers were dispatched for a report of an unresponsive subject and Officer Yankanich was the first to arrive on the scene. He encountered a male who advised him that his 23 year-old female friend had overdosed

on heroin. Officer Yankanich located the female in her bedroom and found her to be unresponsive and in a serious medical condition.

Officer Yankanich immediately prepared and administered the Naloxone Hydrochloride (Narcan) drug issued by the police department. Arriving EMS personnel from the East Brandywine Fire Company began to assist and suddenly realized the victim's heart had stopped. As personnel were repositioning the victim and preparing the AED, the victim's heart restarted and she regained consciousness.

Officer Yankanich's quick response to the scene, his accurate assessment of the victim's condition and his immediate decision to properly administer the Narcan drug are the collective reasons why the overdose victim is alive today. Officer Yankanich's outstanding performance in the line of duty prevented the death of the 23-year-old victim. Officer Jeff Yankanich is commended for an exemplary job well done!

## Congratulations to East Brandywine Fire Company Volunteers!

**T**HE EAST BRANDYWINE Fire Company (“EBFC”) continues to be a leader among volunteer fire companies. The Township is lucky to have this highly trained and motivated team to answer the dozens of monthly calls for fire or emergency medical support. The team supports auto accidents (often with victim injury or entrapment), building fires, chimney fires, commercial building fires, injury, illness, and drug overdose calls among others.

EBFC was very pleased to announce receipt of a \$10,000 grant towards purchasing portable radios. The grant was supported by Take1 Insurance and Fireman’s Fund Insurance Company. These new handheld radios enable emergency responders to better communicate through real-time, clearly articulated instructions and commands at the scene of an emergency.

This year has brought a steady increase of calls of all natures, including multiple house fires, accidents as well as a cardiac arrest save! If you wish to support

## Local Bald Eagle Nest

that eaglet has the white head and tail feathers of an adult eagle and will begin to search for its own mate and to build its own nest.

This year, our East Brandywine Township nest was knocked down in January due to high winds. The birds waited a couple weeks, then rebuilt the nest. They showed signs of possible new egg(s) by closely protecting the nest through the cold and snow of March. But in late March, they were attacked by a trio of bald eagles most likely looking to steal their nest.

The male eagle fought a fierce aerial battle while the female defended the nest. The intruders were eventually chased off, but the local eagles have only been seen occasionally since, no longer standing a steady vigil over their nest. Sandy Moser fears that the eggs (or possibly even hatched eaglets) were harmed during the battle, and the Game Commission has declared a “failed nest” for this year. It is anticipated that the pair will stay in this nest for many years to come.

The exact location of the nest is not disclosed in this article as a courtesy to the nearby homeowners as well as the eagles themselves, who can be injured or killed due to disturbance by throngs of sightseers. But if you would like to see a nest with two hatched eaglets and their parents, a live web-cam is being maintained courtesy of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, HDOnTap.com, and Comcast Business. ## New Monthly Pick-Ups for Bagged Yard Waste

**D**ON'T KNOW WHAT to do with all those leaves, grass clippings, twigs, and other yard waste? East Brandywine Township staff has been working to give residents a new option. Historically, the Township offers leaf collection once in the spring and for three weeks in the fall (dates are always announced on [WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG](http://WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG)). For those collections, residents are encouraged to place leaves on their lawns within 6 feet of the edge of the road. Road crews then use a leaf vac to pick up all the leaves. The Township also offers curbside chipping service by appointment.

**As a new service to residents,** there will be an additional monthly pick-up of certain bagged yard waste during the spring through early fall. In 2015, the first pick-up will be on May 23, then following pick-ups on the last Saturday of June, July, August, September and October. For 2016 and forward, the pick-ups are anticipated to run from April to September—a total of 6 new pick-ups per year.

**What will be collected?** “Yard Waste” is restricted to biodegradable material such as leaves, grass and small branches or twigs (no more than ½ inch in diameter) from general yard and garden maintenance. Yard Waste **DOES NOT** include large branches or tree limbs over ½ inch in diameter.

**How will it be collected?** Yard Waste must be contained in biodegradable bags available at area hardware stores (such as Village Hardware on Route 322). Residents may also place Yard Waste in CLEAN trash cans (they must be completely clean of any household refuse as all Yard Waste is taken to a composting facility which cannot allow contamination of their compost grounds). Allowed trash cans are a maximum size of 95 gallons. Small branches or twigs must **NOT** be bundled with string (again, an issue for the composting facility), but must be placed in the bags or cans. All Yard Waste should be put in appropriate containers, and left at curbside on the last Friday night of the month or very early on the last Saturday morning of the month (pick-up can start as early as 5:30am).

## Recycling & Trash Programs

### RECYCLING

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for recycling and trash removal.

All recyclables will be picked up at curbside weekly—no need to transport recyclables to our Recycling Center.

Currently, two recycling containers are provided to each residence. Put your address on the containers for identification; they are your responsibility if lost or stolen.

The Township has recently changed to “Single Stream” recycling, and received a grant to purchase new containers for all recycling material. Until those containers arrive, residents can put all their recycling materials in either or both of the blue and green containers that they currently have.

All residents must participate in our recycling program. It significantly reduces our tipping fees for garbage. During the 2013 calendar year, approximately 20% of the annual tonnage of East Brandywine’s waste stream was recycled!

Annual fee for recycling is only \$70.00 per residence.

#### RECYCLABLE ITEMS

#1 thru #7 plastics: Such as milk, water and soda bottles; laundry care products; and food containers.

Clear, green & brown glass: Such as beer, liquor and soda bottles as well as food jars

Aluminum, steel & tin: Such as beverage and food cans.

Mixed paper: Such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, catalogs, cereal boxes, grocery bags, home or office paper, books, envelopes, letters, junk mail, wrapping paper, and similar paper products.

Cardboard (small boxes): These must be flattened and tied.

Large corrugated or cardboard boxes must be flattened and taken to the East Brandywine Township building (**not accepted at curbside**).

#### PREPARING RECYCLABLES

Cans, bottles, jars and plastics should be rinsed clean.

Compress plastics and cans to reduce volume; do not break glass.

#### CURBSIDE PICK UP

Place recyclables at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or before 5:30 A.M. Thursday morning for pick up **THURSDAY**.

### TRASH REMOVAL

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for recycling and trash removal.

Annual fee for trash removal is only \$165.00 per residence.

#### WEEKLY TRASH PICK UP

Put your trash at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or early **THURSDAY** morning; the hauler starts at 5:30 A.M.

Weekly limit is the equivalent of three 35 gallon containers or bags from each residence.

May substitute one three foot by three foot securely tied bundle for one 35 gallon container or bag.

Township will pay landfill tipping fee (per ton cost to dump trash). The hauler will strictly enforce the limit.

By recycling, you can avoid exceeding the allowable amount of trash. Paper accounts for 35% of our waste.

#### BULK TRASH PICK UP

Bulk Trash accepted on the last pick up day of each month.

One large item permitted each month, or the equivalent of two 35 gallon or bags in addition to weekly limit.

Weight limited to an item two men can easily lift.

#### ACCEPTABLE BULK TRASH

Furniture, small appliance, water heater, or similar item.

Any air conditioner, refrigerator or freezer must display a sticker certifying the removal of the refrigerant (“freon”) by an authorized dealer or repair facility.

#### UNACCEPTABLE BULK TRASH

Automotive parts, tires, building materials, etc.

Leaves and similar compostable materials; the Township provides curbside pick-up of these materials in the Spring and Fall. Call 269-8230 or check the Township website [WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG](http://WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG) for details. Also see article on Page 6 describing a new program available for residents.

Christmas trees are accepted at the Municipal Complex after Christmas until late February for composting.

### YARD WASTE

The township offers leaf collection once in the spring and for three weeks in the fall (dates are always announced on [WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG](http://WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG)). For those collections, residents are encouraged to place leaves on their lawns within 6 feet of the edge of the road. Road crews then use a leaf vac to pick up all the leaves.

As a new service to residents, there will be an additional monthly pick-up of certain bagged yard waste during the spring through early fall. In 2015, pick-up will be on the last Saturday of May, June, July, August, September and October. For 2016 and forward, the pick-ups are anticipated to run from April to September—a total of 6 new pick-ups per year. **See article on Page 6 for more details of this new service.**

### COMMERCIAL

Commercial Properties are those properties used primarily for commercial or industrial purposes.

All commercial properties must recycle aluminum cans, newspapers, plastic containers, and green, brown and clear glass containers, corrugated paper, and high-grade office paper. All commercial properties must contract with a licensed collector to provide recycle services OR utilize the Township’s Curbside Service. To use the Township’s Curbside Service commercial properties must meet both of these requirements:

- The volume of recyclable materials generated at the commercial establishment will fit in the Township-provided containers; and
- The commercial establishment has access to a curbside location.

Instructions for commercial properties who utilize the Township Curbside Recycle Service are the same those listed for residential customers.

All commercial establishments may use the recycle drop-off facility located at 1214 Horseshoe Pike.
