- The Committee is the primary liaison between property owners and the Township staff/Board of Supervisors regarding open space initiatives.
- Committee members are assigned to work with property owners to explore their land conservation options and to explain the end-to-end process.
- Committee members evaluate property appraisal reports and conservation easement documents. Ultimately, the Committee recommends expenditure of Township Open Space funds to the Board of Supervisors.
- The Committee keeps abreast of relevant proposals coming before the Planning Commission.
- Interaction with the Trails Committee regarding the acquisition of trail easements, proposed routes and construction.

## Will Giant Food Store Come to East Brandywine Township?

**M**ANY AREA RESIDENTS continue to hope for a new Giant Food Store after Stauffer's Market (formerly Cropper's Market) closed suddenly in September of 2015. Given large attendance and resident comments at recent meetings of the Township Board of Supervisors, it is clear that residents want the convenience of a local food market in the Township.

The Board of Supervisors and Township Officials are taking residents concerns seriously. They have devoted many hours to work through the process to review the pending application for Preliminary Plan Approval by Carlino Land Development to begin this project.

In fact, this is the third revision of the application made by Carlino. A similar application was reviewed and approved by the Township, but then overturned on an appeal filed by the adjacent property owner. Another appeal of the plan is currently pending in the Court of Common Pleas. In this third application, the adjacent property owners have exercised their right under the Municipalities Planning Code to request that the Board of Supervisors conduct formal hearings on the new application. Legally, this new application must be reviewed anew, as if the prior two applications had never occurred.

So, based on the prior court ruling, the Township has been required to start the process anew. So far,

## Around the Township

### EAST BRANDYWINE YOUTH ATHLETICS

*Around the Township is an ongoing series of feature articles about Township residents, volunteers, and employees.*

**T**HE SNOWS HAVE melted, the daffodils have bloomed, and the trees have spread a patina of light green that precedes their summer leaves. Though these are all signs of a welcome end to winter, spring doesn't officially start until the umpires at East Brandywine Township Community Park yell "Play Ball!" It is our pleasure to announce that that is exactly what happened on April 16th, the official opening day of spring sports for the East Brandywine Youth Athletics, Inc. (EBYA). Yes folks, the boys and girls of summer are back.



**2015 EBYA Bulls—Cal Ripken 12U Runnersup—US Division.** EBYA teams compete regionally and nationally, but most of all, have fun.

This year spring sports include baseball, softball and soccer. They'll have a hard act to follow this year as the community is still in awe of last year's run of the EBYA Bulls, the 12-year old boys' baseball team that won the State and Mid-Atlantic championships and went to the semi-finals of the Cal Ripken World Series, much further than any team in EBYA history. Though that team is enshrined in EBYA history, the leagues are focused simply on sports fundamentals—learning the game, team play, and fairness.

EBYA is a community sponsored but self-funded non-profit organization dedicated to providing youth sports to the children of East Brandywine Township and neighboring communities. If you have ever passed any of the area's parks in the fall or spring or a summer evening, then you know just how successful EBYA has been in its mission. The organization provides four sports, including:

- Recreational soccer (ages 4-18)
- Baseball
- Cal Ripken 12u baseball
- Babe Ruth 18u baseball
- Girls softball
- Wood bat baseball (high school leagues)
- Basketball (3rd through 12th grade, boys and girls through Downingtown West)

During its tenure of over thirty years, EBYA has seen thousands of children on its teams, many of whom have returned years later to referee, coach, and bring children of their own to play. The organization's mission is to teach athletic skills in an inclusive environment, stressing not just competition, but good sportsmanship, and, most of all, having fun.

Depending on the age and skill level, the teams may compete just within an EBYA league or may compete against other area youth organizations in Chester and neighboring Counties. Registration for most sports is \$80.00 to \$90.00 for the first child, \$70.00 for the second, and \$15.00 for each child after that.

EBYA is lucky enough to have the use of the Township's facilities for baseball and soccer. These facilities are well-known among neighboring youth athletic groups for being state-of-the-art. East Brandywine Township Community Park (referred to in the opening paragraph) was originally a farm purchased by East Brandywine Township. Over the years, the Township and EBYA have constructed three separate baseball complexes, one softball diamond, and six full size soccer fields at the Park. Each of the fields is dedicated to its sport, meaning that it does not double for another sport during the off-season. Depending on the season, the soccer fields can be sub-divided into smaller pitches for the younger age groups. Since soccer is played in both the fall and spring, as is baseball, a visitor to East Brandywine Park during peak season is treated to quite a spectacle. The Township's Spatola Park is also used for some practices and events.

The soccer leagues are separated by age group. Ages 4 and 5 play on co-ed teams in three on three games (teams have a maximum of seven players). The 6-year old league is separated into boys and girls. Both play on ten-person teams in a 7 v. 7 format. After age 6, there are three Divisions for pre-high school soccer. Ages 7-8 play in Division I. Ages 9-10 play in Division II, and ages 11-13 play in Division III. Division play is followed by the high school league for all high school aged athletes.

EBYA baseball has four Divisions which play under the Cal Ripken/Babe Ruth league rules. Tee-ball (age 5-6), Rookie (ages 7-8), Minor (ages 9-10), and Major (ages 11-12).

This year, EBYA Opening Day arrived on Saturday, April 16th. Beautiful weather helped the many athletes, family members and fans enjoy the festivities throughout the day. EBYA provides a wide range of healthy, fun sporting team activities. The league uses East Brandywine Township's quality park facilities, which have expanded significantly along with growth in the Township population.

formal public hearings have been held on February 17th, March 3rd, March 16th, and March 29th. The hearings have included presentations by Carlino on their current plans, by the adjacent property owners regarding their objections, and by local residents during time set aside for public comment. All public comment during the hearings has been in support of building a new food market as quickly as possible.

The Township Board of Supervisors will work as quickly as possible at the close of the public hearings with their legal, engineering and other advisors to give a thorough review to the preliminary plan that has been submitted. Even if the Board elects to approve the plan, it is unknown if the adjacent property owners will again appeal the decision, and then what the outcome of that appeal might be. [Editor's Note: As the Milemarker was going to press, at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on April 20th, the Board gave preliminary plan approval for the proposed Giant subject to several specific conditions.]

In addition, a sketch plan was recently reviewed with the East Brandywine Township Planning Commission to expand and improve the site of the former Cropper's/Stauffer's store in the Brandywine Village Shopping Center. The improvements include a 5,000 sq. ft. expansion to the existing structure, as well as adding additional parking places to replace the parking spaces that will be removed for the new construction.

## ABOUT THE WALL

### A HALF-SCALE REPLICA

The replica Wall is approximately 250 feet in length, and like the original Memorial is erected in a chevron-shape. The replica is constructed of powder-coated aluminum, supported by an aluminum frame, and is made up of 24 individual panels, each containing six columns of names.

The names on The Wall That Heals replicate the names on The Wall in Washington, D.C. As on The Wall, the names are listed alphabetically by day of casualty. Beginning at the center/apex, the names start on the East Wall (right-hand side) working their way out to the end of that wing, picking up again at the far end of the West Wall (left-hand side) and working their way back in to the center/apex. Thus, the beginning and ending of the conflict are joined at the center, signifying an epoch in American history.

The Wall That Heals is transported from community to community by a 53-foot, fifth-wheel trailer with cases built into its sides, allowing it to serve as a mobile Education Center that tells the story of the Vietnam War, The Wall, and this divisive era in American history.

# The Wall That Heals Is Coming to East Brandywine

*July 28<sup>th</sup> to July 31<sup>st</sup>*

**H**OPEWELL UNITED METHODIST Church (UMC) and East Brandywine Township will play host this summer to The Wall That Heals, a 250-foot replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. Part of a national tour, the replica memorial wall and accompanying mobile education center will be on display throughout the day and night, from July 28th to 5:00 PM on July 31st at East Brandywine Township Community Park, 440 Dilworth Road.

Since its debut in 1996, more than two million people have visited The Wall That Heals. It has made stops in nearly 400 U.S. communities in addition to a tour of Ireland and a visit to Canada. Hosting The Wall That Heals provides area residents with a multi-day educational experience on the history of the Vietnam era and The Wall. The exhibit includes a mobile education center comprised of: photos of service members whose names are found on The Wall; letters and memorabilia left at The Wall in D.C.; a map of Vietnam and a chronological overview of the conflict in Vietnam. The exhibits tell the story of the Vietnam War, The Wall and the era surrounding the conflict, and are designed to put American experiences in Vietnam in a historical and cultural context.



The Wall That Heals will be open 24 hours a day from July 28th to July 31st. There is no charge for admission.

Hopewell United Methodist Church and East Brandywine Township are honored to share in hosting The Wall That Heals. Individual residents, businesses, and civic organizations can help by donating to offset the costs of hosting The Wall or volunteering to help at The Wall. ## ANSWERS

1. Also known as "The Corner" (remember the clock?), this site hosted several businesses before it became the Sunoco A+ Mini-Market: Clothes & Shoes to Boot, followed by Video Shelf, then Hodge Podge Shop were on the west end of the building; Harold Thompson's Nationwide Insurance was in the rear; Landhope Farms anchored the middle of the site, including fuel pumps; Fasel's Garden Shop was the original occupant of the east end of the building, followed by Guthriesville Pharmacy, which was then replaced by Blue Moon Florist.
2. Mama Lena's Pizza Restaurant.
3. Regal Cinema Lionville 12 opened in May of 1995 — and was one of the top performing theaters in the Regal chain by January of 1997. The current Regal Downingtown Theater was opened in 1999 to increase the number of screens and parking spaces. Before 1995, residents had to drive to Painters Crossing for the nearest movie theater!
4. Super Fresh. 10 Downing Street.
5. The \$125 million highway opened in late 1995, connecting Route 202 to the existing Coatesville Bypass.
6. 1198 Horseshoe Pike, currently occupied by Weaver Memorials. Bob Cropper leased the building beginning in 1953. He later moved the business to 1155 Horseshoe Pike (the current location of Village Hardware), then moved to the Brandysville Village Shopping Center in 1995.
7. Guthriesville Tire and Service, which relocated to a larger facility at 1528 Horseshoe Pike in May 1999. Ernie Cozzone operated the Atlantic Richfield Service Station at this location before retiring and selling to Guthriesville Tire and Service.

## HISTORICAL POPULATION

Over the last four years, East Brandywine Township has been the fastest growing township in Chester County, adding nearly 600 new residents according to the US Census Bureau. While it seems like all the new development has clogged major roads, it has also brought new businesses and positive change.

### Important Information About Collection

No e-waste will be collected at the 2016 events. What is e-waste? Desktop/laptop computers, monitors, printers, copiers, televisions (both with cathode ray tube and non-CRT), answering machines, camcorders, cell phones, laptop docking stations, electric typewriters, fax/copy machines, microwaves, radios, pagers, remote controls, gaming consoles, stereo/tape/CD players, telephones & equipment, toner/ink cartridges, and VCR/DVD players.

[Note: Chester County Solid Waste Authority’s Lanchester Landfill accepts some e-waste including TV’s, computers, monitors, and small electronics. Call 610-273-3771. Located at 7224 Division Hwy (Rt. 322W), Narvon, PA 17555 (immediately west of Honey Brook Borough). Hours 7am-4:30pm M-F, 7-11:30am Sat].

The following items will not be collected: latex paint (not a hazardous waste—when dry it may be placed in your curbside trash), any appliances containing freon, large appliances, propane, helium tanks, asbestos, infectious or medical waste, radioactive waste, pressurized CFCs & HCFCs, gas cylinders, alkaline batteries, 50 gallon drums, tires, fire extinguishers, explosives, and ammunition.

The collection is for household hazardous waste only, businesses and contractors will be turned away. Proof of residency may be required. The maximum amount accepted is 25 gallons or 220 lbs. All items must be identifiable. Do not mix materials. If you use cardboard boxes to transport materials to the collection sites, you should be prepared to bring the boxes back to your residence for curbside collection (or use the Township drop-off recycle location at 1214 Horseshoe Pike).

# Milemarker Wins PA Statewide Award

**E**AST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP'S efforts to keep its residents updated and informed about the community have earned the municipality an award in the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors' 48th Annual Township Citizen Communication Contest. The annual contest recognizes townships that have successfully communicated programs and activities to citizens. East Brandywine Township received second place in the Class 2 Newsletters category (for townships with populations of 5,001 to 10,000).
